
Favourite roles include Sir Toby in Twelfth Night


the great community at Magnus Theatre. When

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
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FROM PAGE TO STAGE:

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












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Magnus Theatre is thrilled to announce The Next Stage project!

Magnus Theatre has thrived in its first 50 years as Northwestern Ontario's only professional theatre. Demand is growing exponentially for both programming and facility rentals, but upgrades are vital to extending possibilities within the community. The Next Stage is a major infrastructure project launched to restore, upgrade, and expand this unique facility to meet emerging needs of the community and to maximize Magnus Theatre's impact as a cultural and economic force.

The project will see the addition of a 125-seat Studio Theatre, expansion of the Production Shop, renovations to the Lounge, and building improvements and retrofit, all while maintaining the Heritage features of the Central School building.

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
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
